Battling the ItchHow to manage skin problems coming into spring

One of the most common ailments we see dogs for at the vets are **skin problems** – be it itchiness, fur loss, inflamed, weepy or smelly skin, and even sore ears!

Allergic skin disease

Allergic dermatitis is the most common skin problem and the most difficult to diagnose and treat.

The trigger could be environmental, nutritional or parasitic. Remember – allergic skin disease in dogs can often not be CURED. Think of it as similar to hayfever or nut allergies in people. We can MANAGE it, but commonly it will be a life-long affliction – Poor pups!

Environmental Allergies:

Dogs can commonly be sensitive to grasses, plants, pollens or even household things like cleaning products or fibres in their bedding or your furniture.



Nutritional Allergies:

Food allergies in dogs are more common than you think, and can cause both skin and gastrointestinal issues. These dogs are typically allergic to the PROTEINS in pet foods and treats - like beef, chicken and dairy. A low allergen, novel protein diet can help in these cases.



Parasite Allergies:

The normal reaction when an owner sees their dog itching is "fleas!". Repeated exposure to fleas can trigger an allergic reaction. Various ticks and mites can also bury into the skin and cause excessive itching – it's very important to ensure your anti-parasitic treatment is up to date, particularily in an itchy dog.

Infection

Skin infections can occur secondary to allergies, and are often so irritating that your pup will lick continuously at the affected area making it difficult to heal.

Treatment often includes clipping hair from the area to assist drying and application of topical medications, with possible oral antibiotics to fight the infection.

Neurogenic

This is a major diagnostic challenge, often picked up only when all other options have been ruled out. Triggers can cause an impulse in the dog to lick or chew a target area of skin which can then cause deep bacterial infection. A specialist dog dermatologist or behaviourist may be a dog's best friend in these extreme cases.

Hormonal

Like in people, some hormonal imbalances can cause skin issues in dogs. Sometimes we recommend blood tests to look at thyroid function, and other hormones that can affect the skin and fur.

You can definitely start to see how difficult it is to both diagnose and treat itches in our furry friends! So, WHAT can we do?
